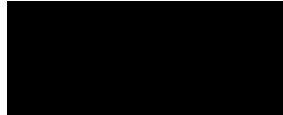
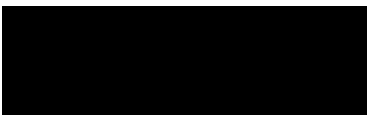

- Human rights concerns surrounding the lack of rehabilitation as a paramount considerations in addition to community safety,
